

### **Describe one feature...**

Identify a feature relevant to the question and then provide some extra detail about that feature. There is no need to add reasons, judgements or evaluations.

### **How useful is source X for Y?**

Identify how useful a source is for the enquiry in the question, what does it say or show which is relevant, what can you infer from it? Think about the historical context, does it seem accurate and typical of the time? Who produced it and when? Are they reliable? Make a judgement about how useful it is and explain why.

### **How could you follow up?**

How could you investigate something further in a particular source using a different source?

### **How far do you agree...?**

Identify and explain evidence which supports and challenges the statement in the question. You must then make your own final judgement explaining why you agree or disagree with the statement.

**Explain the importance of X for Y**

Discuss the consequences of X for Y e.g. how the importance of X helped cause Y.

**Suggest one reason why...**

Give a reason for why two interpretations might offer different views on something with reference to the sources. Explain your answer using examples from the sources.

**What is the main difference...?**

Identify the views in each interpretation which relate to the enquiry in the question. Explain how the two interpretations differ in relation to the enquiry and provide examples from the interpretations to illustrate this.

**Explain why...**

Give clear reasons for why something happened, ideally three reasons.

**Infer**

Provide information you can extract from a source that is not directly stated. Support your inference with evidence from the source mentioned in the question.
